# About the composer

# **Composer notes**

When our director asked me to write a piece about is trodiversity, my husband suggested I use conversations with his couse. Lon, as a starting point. John is on the autism spectrum, and loves nothing more than sharing stories about his life and his friends down to the smalles detail.
